Friends' Central's Upper School provides an exceptional college-preparatory program that is challenging, ambitious, and intellectual. Students are held to the highest academic and personal standards in a supportive, collaborative atmosphere that intentionally cultivates the skills and values of lifelong learners whose classroom experiences extend out into the world they will shape.

Friends' Central classrooms promote independent thought, the courage to voice opinions, the expectation that students and teachers will listen to and value one another's perspectives, and the understanding that diverse viewpoints will elevate discourse.



A Culture That Supports Excellence

In class and out, FCS students are expected to ask questions rather than simply memorize, to apply creative and critical thinking to problem solving, to listen to the group for greater wisdom, and to express their thoughts clearly and with confidence.

The framework of listening and respect creates a classroom culture that nurtures confidence and encourages students to participate fully and to think deeply. The richest intellectual discourse and highest-level problem solving are achieved when all members of a classroom community are fully present, engaged, and invested in knowledge seeking.

Compelling and Engaging Curriculum

Friends' Central's Upper School offers a rich, varied curriculum with advanced classes available. With offerings from Designing Experiments in Molecular Biology to Linear Algebra Advanced to Modern Chinese History to Design Thinking: Innovation & Creation, our curriculum challenges students to learn at a high level while understanding their learning in a larger, global context.

The Friends' Central classroom emphasizes advanced levels of critical and conceptual thinking, both independent and collaborative projects often require significant original research. Experiential and contextual learning add depth and relevance to academic discourse. Students have academic-based travel opportunities to places such as France, Spain, and Costa Rica.













Program Highlights

Science, Humanities, and Justice Core Teams

Core Teams are unique to Friends' Central and seek to inspire the next generation of writers, educators, scientists, researchers, policy makers, and thinkers by bringing renowned scholars to campus for courses and a public lecture. A core group of Upper School students prepares for the lectures in advance and participates in special classes and workshops, both on campus and at the lecturer's home institution, as part of the Distinguished Visiting Humanities, Scientist, and Justice Core Team programs.

Extraordinary Curricular Choice

Each discipline offers a large selection of popular elective courses, many of which are advanced. A small sample includes History of African-American Music, Mixed Media: Appropriation & Reinvention, Photography, and Woodworking; English classes in African-American literature, speculative fiction, film, sports literature, and poetry; history seminars including Capitalism and Consumption, Introduction to Philosophy, Modern Chinese History, Constitutional Identity, and Modern Africa; and courses in genetics, botany, astronomy, anatomy, and atmospheric science and climate change.

Computer Science, Technology, and Data Analysis

We offer introductory and advanced *Computer Science* (Python), *Object-Oriented Programming*, and *Computer Hardware*. Across the curriculum, students develop skills in computing and data analysis: in digital art, math and statistics, science, and the humanities, where students learn to analyze authors' strategic use of data. Students also learn to present data in clear and compelling ways. The Advanced Biology II class, *Designing Experiments in Molecular Biology*, presents its data to the selective Annenberg High School Science Symposium each spring.

Travel Opportunities

The World Languages department offers a range of travel abroad opportunities, including a trip to Italy for Latin students; exchange programs for French and Spanish students in Lyon, France and Seville, Spain; and a trip to Québec City, Canada, for French students. The Science department trips within the country have included a two-day visit to Woods Hole Oceanographic Institute in Massachusetts and a 10-day summer ecology study program in coastal Maine.

Mission-Inspired Leadership

Classes like Digital Design for Social Change, The Sociological Imagination (Race, Class and Gender in an Unequal World), and Everything Change: Love in the Anthropocene, which focuses on climate change, explicitly encourage students to connect what they learn in the classroom to the world around them and to understand their agency in changing that world. The Quaker Testimonies of simplicity, peace, integrity, community, equality, and stewardship shape an inquiry-driven, purposeful, collaborative, and respectful community, in and out of the classroom.

Student-led clubs and activities complement the curriculum with social justice offerings, service organizations, global awareness clubs, environmental groups, and a student honor council.

Our Teachers Make the Difference

Alumni/ae tell us that it is the way our classes are taught that truly distinguishes Friends' Central and prepares students for college and beyond.

Passionate, expert teachers set a high academic bar, delivering innovative, engaging, and challenging content. They are, at the same time, warm and welcoming, caring deeply about their students' intellectual achievements as they attend to students' individual interests, character, and well-being.

Teachers encourage students to apply creative and critical thinking to original problem solving and to present ideas and proposals with confidence. They acknowledge and embrace the idea that everyone should be open to new ideas, paving the way for students to think for themselves and to be accountable for their own learning.

"A specific example of what our teachers are like is when, during biology, I was really interested in the electron transport chain and wanted to understand it better. I had a lunch meeting with my teacher, and we sat in her office discussing it and researching it together. It was really fun to learn more about it and have that one-on-one attention."

Curriculum Overview

ENGLISH

Recognizing the power of strong written and verbal communication, sophisticated reading, careful listening, and critical thinking, Friends' Central requires that all students take English every year. Skills are developed through a curriculum of challenging and diverse texts, both classical and contemporary. In discussion-based seminars, students learn to read carefully, listen with open minds, and speak authentically. Students hone their oral and written expression skills through repeated practice, support, and feedback.

In the second semester of grades 11 and 12, students select from a wide variety of seminar courses, giving them the opportunity to explore an aspect of literature in depth. Writers' Workshop (Advanced), a semester-long class, is also available.

Interested students may participate in a number of related clubs or projects such as *Ink*, our literature and arts magazine, the Humanities Core Team, the Poetry Club, and *Focus*, our Upper School newspaper.

HISTORY

An appreciation of historical context is central to understanding the world around us. Friends' Central's study of history explores human experience: how diverse people(s) have differed in their ideas, institutions, and cultural practices; how experiences vary by period and nationality and social circumstances, and how people(s) have struggled with each other. We ask our students to make connections between the past and the world they now inhabit.

All Upper School students take *Religions and Revolutions* in grade 9 and U.S. History in grade 11 and have the opportunity to write an extensive paper based on original research. Most students also take *Contemporary Global History* in grade 10, and all choose from a broad range of history electives in grade 12.

Clubs such as FCS World Press, Model United Nations, Debate, and Mock Trial offer students opportunities to further their knowledge and expand their public-speaking skills.

MATHEMATICS

Friends' Central's math department combines a belief that Friends' Central students rise to intellectual challenges with a program that offers a high degree of flexibility with respect to course selection and opportunities to advance. Most students complete at least a year of calculus before graduation, and many go well beyond. Advanced students have the opportunity to progress through *Linear Algebra* (*Advanced*) and *Multivariable Calculus* (*Advanced*) by the time they graduate.

Students may participate in many math-related clubs and activities, including a girls' math club, a club for girls who code, and an award-winning math modeling club. FCS students also excel in national and international math competitions.

SCIENCE

The Friends' Central science curriculum strives to foster a deep appreciation for the relevance of science, while cultivating the development of independent learners skilled in critical thinking and original analysis. The sequence of study begins with *Physics I* in grade 9. Subsequently, students enroll in regular or advanced chemistry, biology, and physics classes. Students who are passionate about science may choose to take more than one science course in an academic year; we offer a second year of advanced study in chemistry and biology and a third level of physics. In grades 11 and 12, semester-long electives offer more specialized study in topics including genetics, botany, astronomy, anatomy, organic chemistry, and atmospheric science and climate change.







Science opportunities for students include the Science Core team, the Natural Lands program, clubs like Team Radio Phoenix (which searches for new pulsars), and the opportunity to assist our teachers with their independent research.

WORLD LANGUAGES

The benefit of knowing another language contributes to Friends' Central's commitment to developing globally minded, culturally aware graduates. Students are required to take two consecutive years of a language, and most take a language for four years. Students may study French, Spanish, Latin, or Mandarin, and advanced students may also choose to study Greek.

Language learners' classroom experience is supplemented by opportunities for travel abroad. French and Spanish students may participate in exchange opportunities with schools in Lyon, France and Seville, Spain. A summer service program in Costa Rica is also available for students to further their study of Spanish.

Interested students may also participate in national language competitions and join clubs such as Le Club Francophone, Latin Club, or the Latino Culture Club.

ARTS

The Friends' Central Arts Department offers 23 diverse electives and extracurricular activities encompassing visual and performing arts. We encourage students to discover their individual creative voices and to collaborate within ensembles. Students emerge confident, capable, curious, and expressive from their interactive arts experiences at FCS.

The drama program offers two "main stage" productions each year as well as a 9th & 10th grade play, directed by an FCS senior as a Senior Project. Students in theatre arts classes perform in drama showcases. In our music program, performance opportunities abound (both on and off campus) for students in orchestra, chamber ensembles, jazz band, house band, chorus, and small vocal groups.



ATHLETICS & WELLNESS

Friends' Central's athletic program is considered among the best in the Philadelphia area. We are a leading program in the Friends Schools League (FSL) and Pennsylvania Independent Schools Athletic Association (PAISAA), providing opportunities for leadership, elite competition, and all levels of participation.

Students are required to participate on an athletic team or in the performing arts during six seasons while in the Upper School. The remaining seasons, students participate in a wide variety of wellness activities.

- Are a confident self-advocate who is willing to ask for help

An FCS graduate displays leadership skills and the ability to collaborate. They:

- ▶ Have self-confidence and faith in their own ideas and understand the benefits of others' wisdom
- Are willing to accept responsibility

Our school culture and purposeful teaching style create leadership opportunities that offer space for agency and growth.

Leadership skills, global awareness, and self-discipline are developed throughout the curriculum, as well as in a wide array of co-curricular opportunities including Model United Nations, Student Council, Debate, Mock Trial, affinity groups, athletics, drama, music, maker education, student publications, and numerous other clubs and activities. The Upper School program includes a required community service component, with Upper School students and faculty spending five full days each year working at agencies and organizations throughout the greater Philadelphia region.

We believe that the discoveries our students make, the companies they lead, and all that they create will rely on them as individuals and as team members. They have to be ready to trust themselves to lead, and we begin that process here at Friends' Central.
